# BROOKS-HOWELL RESIDENT RECEIVES TECHNOLOGY THROUGH SIMPLYHOME AND EBLEN CHARITIES

### It has been a great help to me because I can use it on the go.

Rev. Charles Pittman, a retired United Methodist minister, received his first appointment at only 19 years old. During his 48 years of ministry, he also served as an Army Chaplain in Ethiopia and Thailand.

"I fulfilled my call to God by baptizing more than 3,000 men at Fort Polk before they left for war," he notes as he smiles through the tears.

In his late forties, he was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis, which the VA says is a direct result of spinal trauma in the military. Now a resident of Brooks-Howell Home in Asheville, North Carolina, Rev. Charles receives occupational therapy (OT) as part of his health care plan. Monica, Charles' OT assistant, realized that his priorities and needs could be best addressed by a combination of natural supports, assistive technology, and community relationships.

Monica contacted Cameron, Brooks-Howell's Director of Marketing and former employee of *Simply*Home, LLC, and together, they connected Charles with SimplyHome's <u>No</u> <u>Place Like Home</u> program with Eblen Charities. Through this community resource, Charles received an iPad and wheelchair mount. His new tablet gives him more freedom to move around the community and to connect with friends and family through his touchscreen tablet.

### IN MEMORIAM AND IN CELEBRATION: HELENE HILL

Deaconess Helene Hill passed away at Brooks-Howell Home on March 15, 2017 after a period of declining health. She was born March 18, 1920 in North Baltimore, Ohio, the fifth child out of seven and the first girl.



Helene spent thirty years with the national Division of the Department of Community Centers, Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church in Ohio, Delaware, Florida, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Michigan. In June 1950, she was commissioned a Deaconess in New York City and was consecrated in the Central PA conference. In 1978, she was consecrated a

Diaconal Minister in the West Michigan Conference and served as a social worker for many years.

She retired from full time ministry in June 1986 but remained very active by traveling the world doing peace work. Even while retired, she secured a school bus for Colegio Bautista, Nicaragua.

Helene and her daughter, Barbara Crounse, came to Brooks-Howell Home in 1995, and joined Jubilee Community Church in downtown Asheville.

Helene's service was a time celebrated by family, friends, and the Brooks-Howell community. Her minster, Rev. Howard Hanger, and our chaplain, Rev. Alycia Johnson officiated a service filled with singing, interpretive dance, stories, and laughter through tears. Rev. Hanger reminded us that for each of us, Helene's life called us to be engaged in social justice.



Family and friends alike reminded us that we could not be fooled by her passion for shopping, bling, and teddy bears. She was a woman of faith filled with gumption and sass, both which served her well as a family member, a deaconess, a diaconal minister, and a social worker. We love you and celebrate you, Helene.
